# **REQUIREMENTS**

equirements for the Bar/Bat Mitzvah student and family:

- 1) Members in good standing at Park Synagogue
- 2) Currently enrolled in the Religious School or currently attending an area Jewish Day School
- 3) Successful completion of the skill levels described in the curriculum below
- 4) Participation in the Bar/Bat Mitzvah Club
- 5) Bar/Bat Mitzvah lessons designed for student participation in the Bar/Bat Mitzvah service

#### **Hebrew Curriculum**

3rd

**Third graders** learn how to **decode** Hebrew, expand their Hebrew reading skills, and master basic concepts and vocabulary. They use their growing skills to read basic prayers and blessings.

4<sup>th</sup>

**Fourth graders** take a leap in their Hebraic knowledge. With an added emphasis on **fluency**, students participate in prayer study and in reading Hebrew stories. They increase their knowledge of Hebrew and prayer in Shabbat youth services.

5<sup>th</sup>

**Fifth graders** build on decoding and fluency, with an emphasis on **participation**. Students focus specifically on the Amidah and the Shabbat morning service. On Shabbat, they may use their skills as they participate in Youth Services.

6<sup>th</sup>

**Sixth graders** focus on a greater **understanding** of prayers and engage in an in-depth study of the Torah service.

7<sup>th</sup>

**Seventh graders** have the opportunity to put the "*mitzvah*" of their Bar/Bat Mitzvah into practice. The 7<sup>th</sup> grade curriculum connects our middle school teens to the experiences and responsibilities of our Jewish and world communities. Our focus is formulating a personal Jewish identity through *mitzvot* and Hebrew study, plus Bar/Bat Mitzvah lessons with Gadi Galili.

As with any foreign language, comfort and ease in reading Hebrew comes with frequency and repetition. The more exposure, the more familiar your child will be. Your child's "regular" school may teach foreign language four to five days a week. Our Hebrew School is a supplemental two to three day program. If your child is not developing their Hebrew at a comfortable pace in the two-day option, you can add a third day. Adding a third day greatly increases the Hebrew level of many of our students. Remember, children learn differently and at their own pace. Please be aware of your own child's progress and be in touch with us!

Whatever option you choose, parental encouragement, regular attendance, and family participation at Shabbat services greatly enhances the student's motivation and confidence in preparation for his/her Bar/Bat Mitzvah lessons.

Bar/Bat Mitzvah Club
A required course for ALL
sixth grade students,
including Jewish Day School
students and parents
(grandparents are also
welcome!), held on either
Saturday or Sunday morning,
mid-January through
mid-May. The group
addresses questions of
"good" and "evil," free will,
making prayer relevant, as



well as Jewish history and culture, in a new, interactive and fun way with the rabbis and other clergy. The morning includes prayer, study, breakfast, and special group programming as well as opportunities to get to know other families experiencing this milestone.



# Shabbat Youth Services

An important part of the learning process (parents are always welcome, too!); services are held throughout the academic year on Shabbat morning and ensure familiarity with the customs of our synagogue. They are fully participatory and give every student the opportunity to help lead.

Students in third through sixth grade who attend one Youth Service a month on Shabbat morning are more comfortable performing their Bar/Bat Mitzvah part on their special day.



# Mitzvah Project

The synagogue encourages students to take part in a Bar/Bat Mitzvah Project with a focus on social action, community service or a worthy cause in the community. Students should plan to complete their Mitzvah Project by the end of sixth grade or the first half of seventh grade.



# TIMETABLE

reparation leading up to the Bar/Bat Mitzvah follows a timetable to ensure that every student is fully prepared and confident on his/her special day. Please also make sure your **dues are current** to ensure full participation in the Bar/Bat Mitzvah process. Below is the timetable leading up to the ceremony.

Three Years Before: Save the Date

During the student's fourth grade year, Rabbi Skoff and Park's Ritual Director, Gadi Galili, assign a

Bar/Bat Mitzvah date. Gadi Galili will send the family a letter to confirm the date.

# One Year Before: Learning Opportunities & Plans for the Ceremony

- Parents will receive a letter and contract from the Executive Director's Assistant explaining the fees for the Bar/Bat Mitzvah preparation and ceremony.
- Sixth graders along with their parents (and/or grandparents) attend the **Bar/Bat Mitzvah Club**, which meets on Sundays from mid-January to mid-May.
- Parents are invited to attend Rabbi Skoff's weekly Bible Study to learn about and study their child's Torah portion. (Contact Rabbi Skoff's office for more information).
- 7-11 Months Before: Lessons with Gadi Galili
  Families will be contacted by Gadi Galili's Assistant to set up a weekly tutoring schedule. Please feel free to discuss any issues or special needs with Rabbi Skoff or Gadi. We want every student to succeed. Many students say it is so much fun working with Gadi that they look forward to their lessons each week!
- 3 ½ Months Before: Meetings with Rabbi Skoff Rabbi Skoff's Executive Assistant will contact the family to schedule appointments which will include:
- 1) Time for Rabbi Skoff and the student to meet and help develop his/her Bar/Bat Mitzvah speech; 2) Time for Rabbi Skoff to meet with the Bar/Bat Mitzvah student and parents to finalize details for their particular event.

Throughout the Bar/Bat Mitzvah year, Rabbi Skoff and Gadi are in close contact regarding the student's progress. Parents receive periodic updates from Gadi making sure everything is "on track." Rabbi Skoff is available for consultation and advice for any issue of concern throughout the process. An early consultation can alleviate any concerns.



## One Month Before – Publicity to the Community

Gadi Galili's Assistant will contact the family for a high-resolution headshot (head and shoulders) photo of the student and a short bio. The photo and bio will appear in the *Cleveland Jewish News* and in *The Park Synagogue Bulletin*.

# The Week of the Ceremony

- Morning Minyan: The week prior to the Bar/Bat Mitzvah, the student will lead the morning minyan with the Clergy and the Ritual Director. Families may choose to sponsor the breakfast that follows the morning minyan service.
- Rehearsal: Usually takes place the week before the ceremony at Park Synagogue Main. During the
  rehearsal, the parents and student run through the family's parts in the service. At the rehearsal,
  photographs may be taken in the Sanctuary.
- Friday Night Shabbat: The student and family are encouraged to attend the Friday night Shabbat service preceding the Bar/Bat Mitzvah ceremony. The Friday evening service provides some of the most joyous moments of the weekend and families should confirm attendance with Rabbi Skoff's office. The family is invited to lead selected prayers, including the blessing over the candles and the Kiddush following the service. Some families also enjoy having a private Shabbat dinner at the synagogue following the evening service. # THE CEREMONY & CELEBRATION

he majority of Bar and Bat Mitzvah ceremonies at Park Synagogue are held on Shabbat morning. However, if special circumstances exist, please contact Rabbi Skoff or Gadi Galili.

The Shabbat morning service begins at 9:00 a.m. in the Sanctuary. The Bar/Bat Mitzvah family should be at the synagogue by 8:45 a.m. Guests should plan to arrive by 9:45 a.m.



# Program

The synagogue prepares a Shabbat morning program that includes the name of the Bar/Bat Mitzvah, the Parsha (Torah portion), Torah readers, and acknowledgment of family members as well as the sponsors for the Kiddush (reception).

# Kippot

While the synagogue has black *kippot* (head coverings) available, a family may choose to purchase special *kippot* in honor of the Bar/Bat Mitzvah child. They may bring these *kippot* in a basket placed outside the sanctuary. It is required that all males cover their heads with a *kippah* during the service.

#### **Tallit**

During the service, the parents present their child with a *Tallit* (prayer shawl). They may use a family heirloom or one they purchase for the child. (You may purchase a special *Tallit* at the Sisterhood Gift Shop at Park East.)

# Gifts

During the Bar/Bat Mitzvah service, a number of gifts are given to the Bar/Bat Mitzvah from the synagogue and the Cleveland Jewish Community. Each student receives a gift from the Park Synagogue Men's Club and/or Sisterhood, as well as a "Gift of Israel" certificate from the Jewish Education Center of Cleveland. The certificate can be the first investment towards a trip to Israel or added to existing funds. For more information about the Gift of Israel, please contact the Jewish Education Center of Cleveland.

#### **Etiquette & Attire**

In observance of Shabbat and Festivals, we request all cell phones be turned off or silenced. Smoking is prohibited everywhere on the synagogue property. As role models for the congregation, family and guests should follow the service in the prayer book and participate in readings and prayers.

Family and guests should also be encouraged to wear appropriate synagogue attire, particularly if the family member is participating in the service. All males must wear a *kippah* in the sanctuary or chapel.

#### Flowers

We provide fresh flowers on the *bimah* (pulpit) each week and the cost is shared between the synagogue and the Bar/Bat Mitzvah families as part of the Kiddush Fee (see page 11).

Families may take the opportunity to perform a *mitzvah* by using food baskets instead of flowers to decorate the bimah. After the Bar/Bat Mitzvah, the family would then donate the basket contents to an area food bank or shelter. The family will need to make arrangements ahead of time with the synagogue for the baskets as well as provide all contents, which must be kosher. ### Kiddush

Traditionally, Bar/Bat Mitzvah families sponsor the Congregational Kiddush after Shabbat services on the day of the simcha (celebration). The standard Congregational Kiddush is included in the Kiddish Fee (*see page 11*) and usually consists of two *challot*, sponge cake, honey cake, sheet cake, *kichel*, *mandel* bread, brownies and assorted cookies, wine and grape juice.

# Extended Kiddush Option

The synagogue also offers the Bar/Bat Mitzvah family the option of an extended Kiddush or more elaborate meal for the congregation and guests after services by an in-house or outside caterer. The synagogue can provide you with a list of approved caterers. If your family is planning a private catered luncheon or dinner, we encourage you to hold it at Park Synagogue, where we offer numerous options at both buildings. Park Synagogue recognizes the desire of many families to record their child's celebration as a memento of this religious experience. However, the use of photography and videography on Shabbat is contrary to traditional Jewish law. Please instruct your photographer and/or videographer about the following guidelines prior to the day of the ceremony:

- Park does not allow photography or videography during the synagogue service or the congregational Kiddush (reception) which follows immediately at the conclusion of the services for the entire congregation.
- During a private celebration in the synagogue after services, photography and videography are allowed. The photographer and/or videographer can move freely among the guests during the private hors d'oeuvre (appetizer) hour. Once the meal begins, we ask that the photographer and/or videographer not move table to table but rather set up in a corner of the room. Guests who wish to be videotaped or photographed can take a picture or leave a message related to the Bar/Bat Mitzvah.

#### Shabbat Clubhouse

This free, drop-in service provides supervised and fun Shabbat activities for toddlers through first graders while adults attend services in the Main Sanctuary. Open to all congregants and guests attending services on Shabbat mornings.



#### Music

On Shabbat, music may be played during the private celebration. Amplifiers and other electrical equipment are prohibited, but instruments that do not require amplification, other than through the use of a microphone, can be used. Music selected should be Jewish or otherwise tasteful and appropriate in keeping with the mood of the day. During an extended Kiddush, appropriate music may be played approximately fifteen minutes after services are over.

# Luncheon & Dinner Celebrations

Celebrating a Bar/Bat Mitzvah at Park Synagogue with a luncheon or dinner is a natural and wonderful way to continue the special event that begins with the Saturday morning religious service. Park offers several exceptional dining venues. At Park Main, our Bridge is very popular for lunch or dinner and so are Goldberg Hall in the Kangesser building and the Rosenthal Ballroom. At Park East, the Miller Social Hall is another good option for either lunch or dinner celebrations.

# BAR/BAT MITZVAH FEES

Bar/Bat Mitzvah fee will appear on your membership statement at the beginning of the student's sixth grade year. The fee covers the formal preparation costs of Bar/Bat Mitzvah instruction and tutoring, as well as breakfast, programs, and speakers during the Bar/Bat Mitzvah Club (which meets every Sunday morning from mid-January to mid-May of the sixth grade year).

# CONTINUING EDUCATION

aking a commitment to lifelong learning fulfills the true meaning of being a Bar/Bat Mitzvah. A student's involvement in Jewish education beyond the Bar/Bat Mitzvah ceremony, including Confirmation Class and our Junior/Senior Seminar, is a greater indication that the student will identify with Judaism as an adult, more significantly than even the Bar/Bat Mitzvah ceremony.



**Students:** The continuity of our religion is based on a lifetime of Jewish learning. We encourage every Bar/Bat Mitzvah student to continue their Judaic education at Park's Wolf Religious School.

- **7th-9th Grades:** The focus will be on discovering personal identity as it relates to society and the world we live in. In 8th and 9th grade, there are opportunities for being a **Madrich** (Teacher's Aide) which is a paid or volunteer position, **Bible History Study**, and/or **Klezmer Band**. Students will also have the opportunity to perform a variety of community *mitzvot*.
- **10th Grade:** This is the time for students to declare a more adult commitment to Jewish life. We explore the theme, "Balancing Justice and Mercy in our Everyday Lives." Students study with Federal Judge Dan Polster and Rabbi Skoff. Students visit Judge Polster's courtroom and participate in a weekend Shabbaton.
- 11th- 12th Grades: Students discuss the "big questions" of Judaism with Rabbi Skoff and a community of their peers. The curriculum alternates yearly between "When Bad Things Happen to Good People" and "The Secrets of Life Your Parents Never Told You."
- **USY:** Our United Synagogue Youth chapter offers a number of fun local and national activities and programs for **eighth through twelfth graders.** Teenagers find the kind of friends they want to stay in touch with for the rest of their lives.
- **Parents:** Parents are welcome to continue their lifelong Judaic learning by joining Rabbi Skoff's Bible Class on Sunday mornings from 11:00 a.m. to Noon. Hebrew, Talmud, Spirituality and Judaica classes meet throughout the year. Be sure to check *The Park Synagogue Bulletin* for other opportunities.

As part of the religious school curriculum, students participate in *tzedakah* projects in every grade level. There are also many opportunities at Park for families to perform *mitzvot* and acts of loving-kindness.
